Understanding the Judiciary

Monday March 19th *- Lisa Holmes, Assoc. Prof. Political Science, UVM* <u>What Every Citizen Should Know about the American Judiciary</u>

The American judiciary has far-ranging responsibilities in our political system, at both the federal and state levels. These responsibilities run the gamut from checking the powers of the other branches of government to resolving minor traffic offenses. The power and structure of the American judiciary is therefore a crucial component of the American political system.

Monday April 2nd - *Dan Richardson, Attorney with Tarrant, Gillies, and Richardson*Retaining the Bones: Challenges for the Vermont Supreme Court in the 21st Century

Unlike the U.S. Supreme Court, the Vermont Supreme Court is an appellate court of right. That means the Justices in Vermont hear all types of cases and generate over five times as many decisions per year as their federal peers. Today's Supreme Court faces a variety of challenges from the opiate crisis to the need of quicker dispute resolution processes. This presentation will highlight recent history of the Court, recent challenges that the Court has faced, and some of the emerging problems that it faces in the next five years.

*Tuesday April 10th - *John Hughes, Prof. Political Science, Saint Michael's College* The U.S. Supreme Court 2017-2018 Term

We will discuss several cases currently before the U.S Supreme Court that potentially have long-term consequences for our politics. Topics might include cell phone tracking, non-discrimination laws and couples seeking same-sex marriages, legislative gerrymandering or whatever else might land on the Court's doorstep before the current term ends.
